# **News and Notes**

While it is still the middle of June, many are already looking ahead to plan for schools to be back in session in a month and a half, athletic practices and competitions, hurricane season which hits the peak shortly after that, and flu season to begin shortly after that. What will all these activities look like in a COVID-19 world? Meanwhile, resource distribution, sample collections, data analysis and contact tracing continues. The hours of operation have been scaled back, but it is still operating from 8:00 AM to 11:00 PM.



## **COVID-19 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19)**



The New Georgia Project held a virtual Town Hall meeting Thursday night. The topic was serology testing that was conducted in late April and early May in Fulton and Dekalb Counties. 'Filling the Gap' featured prominent panelists including Dr. David Satcher, former Surgeon General, Dr. Lynn Paxton, Fulton County HD, Joe Bresee from CDC, and Dr. Abdul El-Sayed, former PH prof. at Columbia University. They each had some valuable information and insight into the current state of affairs. Satcher said while health disparities are better recognized, as a country we have yet to take them seriously, and it will take discipline and better communication of goals to accomplish. Paxton said it is everyone's hope that we have a COVID-19 vaccine, and equally important that everyone accepts it. Bresee said bad information is okay at times, but in the realm of public health, bad information can be deadly. El-Sayed said there is a danger that real change is though as something that can happen right away, as opposed to the reality that it is something that takes time and persistence.
